""A message from the Chair of Trustees"

The Refugee Hub has had one year of supporting refugees, asylum seekers and at risk migrants in our community. We are very thankful to the excellent multi-agency support provided, as well as the sharp increase in client referrals from education, foodbanks, social and local services in the city.'

A year with unique challenges

This year Portsmouth City of Sanctuary (PCoS) supported a rise in newly dispersed asylum seekers to the city. A local hotel was commissioned as emergency overspill accommodation by the Home Office. And a further apartment block in Portsmouth North, saw significantly increased numbers requiring orientation and other support, which we immediately provided.



Local Trends Casework

We have assisted over 600 asylum seekers and refugees (including dependants) with orientation casework in the last year. Asylum seekers are accommodated across the city, with at least 70% registered with PCoS arriving in Portsmouth in the last 12-18 months.



Top Casework Issues	Many asylum seekers are without legal advice or representation because of extended waiting periods and low availability. This is a local and national trend. Newly dispersed asylum seekers may be waiting in excess of six months to access a legal aid solicitor, the closest being in Southampton.		
Access to Justice			
Mental Health	We have seen an increase in mental health issues, and focus on tackling this within our casework and project support. Many clients are survivors of abuse and torture, presenting with PTSD, and feelings of depression and helplessness.		
Gender Violence	More women are also presenting with gender and domestic violence experiences, including forced marriage, trafficking, exploitation, and FGM violence, which has occurred en route to the UK, in their country of origin, or indeed here.

Citizens Advice

We have referred 82 clients from October 2021 -September 2022 to Citizens Advice for immigration advice which does not fall under asylum legal aid.



Local MP for Advocacy Issues

We have seen an increase of referrals to local MP's for issues around long wait times for substantive interviews, ARC Card enquiries and housing issues.



Community Impact



We are thankful to many organisations for providing activities

- In December 2021, 60 asylum seekers attended the pantomime at the Kings Theatre.
- Our men's football team toured The Emirates Football stadium.
- 60 asylum seekers visited the historic dockyard.
- Over 20 children participated in HAF Activities throughout the summer.
- Asylum seekers on our gardening project planted over 300 saplings as part of the Queens Canopy, Jubilee Celebrations.
- We gave away nearly 20 bicycles to those in the community.
- 40 Asylum seekers were given First Aid training in the community.
- Nearly 30 women attended our women's group HAVEN, for empowerment, well-being sessions.
