

Their local MP Steve McCabe was there in order to present a different award, but as he is a keen supporter of our Schools of Sanctuary, he was happy to be involved in our presentation too!



At Halesowen College we heard from the Principal and also directly from one of their ESOL pupils who confirmed the support and



encouragement he and all his peers receive from the staff and the other pupils. This is a college which goes above and beyond - organising a summer school during the six-weeks holidays and already making plans for activities during the Christmas holidays so that the young people they care for will be able to keep in touch.

St Benedict's Primary School - Theatre Workshops with the Rep

St Benedict's Primary School in Small Heath was able to invite a specialist education worker from the Rep (Birmingham's Theatre of Sanctuary) to run sanctuary-themed workshops throughout the whole of the autumn term.

In October, they held the first part of their Festival of Sanctuary, where the children presented the results of their work looking at different aspects of Sanctuary. The children were supported by their parents, who also watched a beautiful video prepared by a Year 6 pupil.





An explanatory display outlined the way the pupils had worked, and explained the different aspects covered - the Inclusion Hub looked at Animal Sanctuary (rescue), Year 2 looked at Plant Sanctuary (protecting the earth) Year 4 groups at Religious Sanctuary (seeking refuge after a natural disaster) and The Journey of a Modern Refugee (new sights, smells, fears, we welcome them) and Year 6 studied a historical example of sanctuary as experienced by evacuees during World War 2.

The Festival of Sanctuary was enjoyable and at times very moving - the children had obviously thought deeply about the issues raised in their work with the Rep.

This year's National Poetry Day had the theme of "Refuge" and our schools were more than happy to embrace this topic and share their work.




Holy Family (Small Heath) made REFUGE their Word of the Week and encouraged children from all across the school to produce very moving poems.







St Mary & St John (Erdington) used specially-designed ORANGE HEART paper for their poems:

And at St Bernard's Primary in Moseley, every child in the school contributed to a chalk mural expressing solidarity with those seeking sanctuary.










Our schools continue to speak up on behalf of asylum seekers, to express their solidarity, and to learn from books and from people with lived experience.

Art work at Nishkam High School

Nishkam High School is a Sikh-ethos secondary school in Newtown. As part of their learning about asylum-seekers and refugees, Years 8 and 10 created this stunning art work in their main foyer.

This art work is part of a declaration and pledge to be a 'School of



Sanctuary', raising awareness of the issues that face young people when forced to



leave/flee their homes. It is a reminder that anybody can become a refugee; it is up to us to create a culture of welcome and inclusion for young people who are faced with many challenges so far away from their homes, parents or loved ones.

The portraits represent people just like us. Whilst their circumstances are different to our own, we should be reminded that becoming a refugee can happen to anybody.

There are different colours throughout the work. Imagine that all the faces you see belong to young people, this now signifies the children who have fled from their homes; at least 40% of refugees are children:

The clear/white represents children aged 15 – 17 years

The green represents children from the age of 0 – 4 years

The red represents 1 in every 3 children who are displaced and do not have a home. (statistics taken from UNICEF on refugees in Europe)

Finally, you may notice the art work almost looks like a fishnet. Small pieces of string were used to bind every pupil's piece of work. The fishnet is a reminder of the treacherous journey that many refugees must make, knowing there is a possibility they will not survive. The fishnet created by our Year 8s and Year 10s is a positive reminder for those who do survive, that we will provide them with a safe place and sanctuary to grow, develop and flourish to live out their hopes and dreams without fear.

Wyndcliffe Primary - the whole world in a school!

Rubina Begum reports on the EAL and World Cultural Day with celebration and language exchange.

At Wyndcliffe Primary School, we are an inclusive school with a large multi-cultural and multi-lingual cohort that is constantly evolving. Every year we welcome pupils, who have arrived in England from across the world, into year groups across the school. In the past two years alone we have welcomed over 55 pupils from across three continents and over nineteen countries including: Denmark, Sweden, Norway, Netherlands, Pakistan, Somalia, India, Syria, Senegal, Afghanistan, Palestine, Bangladesh, Spain, Iraq, Italy, Belgium, France, Sudan and South Africa!







One of the many ways in which we celebrate our multi-cultural and multi-lingual cohort, is through our EAL and World Cultural Day celebrations. This year, all pupils and staff attended school in clothing that was traditional to their cultures. After having identified the many and varied languages and cultures present within their year groups, not only did pupils practise greeting each other in those languages, but they also then retold either a nursery rhyme or story, and also re-presented its book cover, in those

languages and cultures. The many languages also included the PECS (Picture Exchange Communication) and Makaton systems of communication.







The day allowed us to celebrate

our school's linguistic and cultural range, promote inclusion, mutual respect and tolerance, foster an appreciation of diversity in languages and cultures, develop an understanding of translation and accessibility, and to learn how nursery rhymes and stories can be represented through different languages, communication systems and cultures. The day was thoroughly enjoyed by all!

We always like to welcome new schools to our network, and one of the most recent to join us is the King Solomon International Business School. Some of you may have seen this school while driving along the nearby dual carriageway, so we are delighted to share the information provided by Head Teacher Darren King:

King Solomon International Business School is a multi-denominational Christian school serving children in the heart of Birmingham from age 4 -19. As an all-through school, we have the opportunity to educate and nurture our young people from 'cradle to career'. We do this by following the Fruit of the Spirit - our relationships are built on Gentleness, Kindness, Joy, Patience, Self-control, Trustworthiness, Goodness, Peace... and love. We value and welcome everybody: this is who we are.

Put simply, everyone is welcome at King Solomon.



We are here to be a place of sanctuary as well as a place of learning for our children. A place where they feel safe and loved.

Therefore, we naturally share an ethos and vision with Schools of Sanctuary and feel privileged to partner up with an organisation that shares the same moral compass as ourselves.

On our recent visit to the school we were impressed by the way this former office block has been transformed into a friendly and colourful environment in which their pupils can feel safe and cared for.

As we noted at the beginning of the Newsletter, HALESOWEN COLLEGE recently received their SECOND AWARD. Here, Schools Hub Manager Erika Walkington gives us an update on their latest activities.

Halesowen College has been working with Birmingham Schools of Sanctuary since 2017. We were first awarded College of Sanctuary status in December 2019 and were the second college in the country to get this award. We were successfully re-accredited in July 2023. Staff sit on the National Colleges of Sanctuary Steering Committee and have helped design the current framework and mentor other colleges who are seeking accreditation. There are currently 16 Colleges of Sanctuary in the UK.

Halesowen College approaches sanctuary in a very broad way, aiming for college to be a safe space for all students. We offer a wide range of enrichment groups including such Chess, Warhammer, Craft and Lego groups. These groups are open to all students and attended by those from Foundation to L3. Most of our students who are refugees or asylum seekers are studying ESOL. Many of our ESOL students attend enrichment groups and we also arrange additional activities including ESOL Reading Buddies, ESOL Football and Ramadan Football tournament.



In August we ran a 4-week ESOL Summer Programme. During this programme we provided a day travel pass so students could get to college and have lunch each day they were on site. We arranged a variety of activities including Sport, Craft, Cooking on a

Budget, Careers/employability sessions and time in our Animal Care Unit. 20 ESOL students attended the ESOL Summer Programme and we celebrated this with an award ceremony during the final session, attended by the College Principal and Chair of Governors.



We will be repeating a holiday programme for these students during the Christmas break.
