





WHAT IS REFUGEE WEEK?

A UK-wide festival celebrating the contributions, creativity and resilience of refugees and people seeking sanctuary. Founded in 1998 and held every year around World Refugee Day on the 20 June, Refugee Week is also a growing global movement.

Through a programme of arts, cultural, sports and educational events alongside media and creative campaigns, Refugee Week enables people from different backgrounds to connect beyond labels, as well as encouraging understanding of why people are displaced, and the challenges they face when seeking safety. Refugee Week is a platform for people who have sought safety in the UK to share their experiences, perspectives and creative work on their own terms.

Refugee Week's vision is for refugees and asylum seekers to be able to live safely within inclusive and resilient communities, where they can continue to make a valuable contribution".



Theme of Refugee Week 2021: We Cannot Walk Alone

14th - 20th June

The theme of Refugee Week 2021, 'We Cannot Walk Alone', is an invitation to you and your students to extend your hand to someone new. Someone who might be outside your current circle; has had an experience you haven't.

Inspiration for the this year's theme comes from, 'I Have A Dream': Martin Luther King's speech delivered during the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom, 1963

Little Amal, a young refugee, embarks on a remarkable journey – an epic voyage that will take her across Turkey, across Europe. To find her mother. To get back to school. To start a new life. Will the world let her? Can she achieve what now seems more impossible than ever?

Following the phenomenal international success of The Jungle, Good Chance, in collaboration with world-famous creators of War Horse Handspring Puppet Company, will present its most extraordinary work yet: The Walk – a travelling festival of art and hope in support of refugees, with Artistic Direction from Amir Nizar Zuabi.



Little Amal (The Walk continued)

- In July to November 2021, Little Amal will 'walk' from the Syria-Turkey border all the way to the UK, The Walk will bring together celebrated artists, major cultural institutions, community groups and humanitarian organisations to create one of the most innovative and adventurous public artworks ever attempted.
- At the heart of The Walk is 'Little Amal', a 3.5 metre-tall puppet of a young refugee girl, created by the acclaimed Handspring Puppet Company. Representing all displaced children, many separated from their families, Little Amal will travel over 8,000km embodying the urgent message "Don't forget about us".
- Although this huge project doesn't arrive in the Uk until November and to its final destination, the
 Manchester, we felt that it could be so inspirational and feed into any ideas you may have and for
 embedding work done, long after Refugee Week has passed. It is extremely relevant to our 2021 theme.

- Before, during and after her journey Little Amal will connect people from refugee and non-refugee communities through creative learning projects to help forge lasting bonds of friendship. The Walk's Education programme will be developed by, with and for each community, responding to local realities with a focus on bringing people together through projects that transcend borders, culture and language. Working with all age groups, Chance Theatre aspires to build a programme of workshops, performances and apprenticeships that celebrate migration and which have the potential to empower what might otherwise be a lost generation of refugee children.
